Personalized healthcare when it matters most





Having one knee replaced is a significant medical procedure, but imagine having both knees replaced at the same time. This is exactly what Mike Gabeline of Yarmouth had done at Henry County Health Center with Joseph Tansey, M.D., HCHC's board certified orthopedic surgeon.

After having x-rays at

HCHC to find out the cause of his knee pain, Dr. Tansey recommended that Gabeline have both knees replaced.

"When I said I wanted to have both knees done at the same time, he said considering my age and upper body strength that he could do that. But he told me if during the surgery something didn't go as planned or if I wasn't acting the way he wanted me to, that I couldn't be mad at him when I woke up if I only had one knee done. He said he would do what was best for me as far as my health was concerned," explained Gabeline.

Dr. Tansey got him into surgery and successfully replaced both knees.
Gabeline was pleased with the results of the surgery and so much more.

"I got right in and both knees came out very well. I had surgery on a Monday and by Friday I was home. HCHC is a small hospital but I got all the things patients get in a big hospital. From the stateof-the-art operating rooms to the staff, everything was great," he said. Gabeline's daughter had heard positive things about Dr. Tansey and recommended him to her father. In addition, Gabeline wanted to receive his healthcare close to home because it would be easier on him and his family. He feels his decision to have his procedure and therapy done locally was definitely the right choice.

"There is value to receiving care close to home by people in my community. It felt like family."

"The day of orientation I was taken through surgery and met the surgery staff and anesthetist who would care for me during surgery. Then I went to Inpatient Services where I met the nurses, saw the room I would stay in, and was shown everything that was going to happen. There were no surprises and it was just like clockwork. I knew everything that was going to happen before it happened," he explained.

Gabeline was pleased with the care and the successful outcome of the procedure, noting two specific processes that were very significant. "I did not want a tube down my throat during surgery if possible. Anesthetist Matt Miller did a block instead and he did an unbelievable job. I was also impressed with the icing method that Dr. Tansey used. After talking to others who have had the same procedure elsewhere, I've never heard of anyone using this icing method that I had. It's something specific that Dr. Tansey uses and it was unbelievable how it helped me. I used it at home, too, and it really helped keep the swelling down."

Following surgery, Gabeline followed Dr. Tansey's orders closely and did physical

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Imaging Services

HCHC offers 3-D mammography

Early detection is the best protection against breast cancer. Henry County Health Center patients can be assured that they are getting advanced breast imaging with HCHC's Hologic Selenia Dimensions 3-D mammography.

Breast tomosynthesis, often referred to as 3-D mammography, allows doctors to see masses and distortions associated with cancers and precancerous cells significantly more clearly than conventional 2-D mammography. Instead of viewing all of the complexities of breast tissue in a flat image, as with traditional 2-D mammography, fine details are more visible with 3-D imaging and no longer hidden by the surrounding tissue.

A 3-D mammography exam is very similar to having a traditional 2-D mammogram. Like a 2-D mammogram,

COST OF 3-D MAMMOGRAPHY

There is an additional \$60 charge for 3-D mammography (\$28 technical fee and \$32 radiologist professional fee). Breast tomosynthesis is a relatively new procedure and may not meet all insurance providers' medically necessary criteria. Therefore, patients choosing to not pay the additional fee for 3-D mammography at the time of service may choose to have 2-D mammography.

the technologist will position the patient, compress the breast, and take images from different angles. However, with the 3-D mammogram the radiologist can see finer details throughout the breast, with the procedure taking less than 10 seconds.

"Patients will not necessarily notice a difference in the procedure. They will still be placed under compression

to acquire the images," explained Deb Steenblock, HCHC Mammography Quality Control Coordinator. "The difference between 2-D and 3-D mammography is that 3-D acquires more images per exposure giving the radiologist more information."

Studies have shown that 3-D mammograms result in the following benefits for patients:

- 30-35 percent increase in cancer detection
- 11 percent decrease in biopsy rate
- An approximate 40 percent reduction in recall rates
- 40-50 percent increase in invasive cancer detection

In addition, 3-D mammography has superior diagnostic accuracy for all breast types. Very low x-ray energy is used during the exam, with the total patient dose being well within the FDA safety standards for mammography.

HCHC's mammography technicians are specifically trained in this area of imaging. In addition to offering cutting-edge 3-D mammography, HCHC's Women's Center provides a private and comfortable waiting area with direct entry to mammography, bone density and ultrasound testing. 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therapy in HCHC's Rehabilitation Services. He is walking unassisted and his knees are feeling great. After his experience, Gabeline would definitely recommend HCHC to others.

"I did everything from my x-rays, to surgery, to therapy at HCHC. I received such personal care all the way around from medical staff to dietary. Staff was there at all times, checking on me and making sure things were right.

After I left the hospital, they contacted me at home every day. Everyone knew what was going on from the day I came here to the time I was done. It's one big family."

HCHC construction project improves patient access

Henry County Health Center is making improvements to the north parking lot and canopy for the Rehabilitation and Administration entrance. This project will enhance the environment of the facility and improve patient access to services. In response to patient needs, HCHC will be re-pouring the surface of the existing parking lot, expanding the parking area, adding space for handicap parking and converting to angled parking.

The project began at the beginning of September, with completion slated for the middle of November. During this time, patients and visitors needing the following departments must enter through the main lobby entrance of the health center by the fountain. There are volunteers, staff, and signage to assist with navigation through the health center to the north end of the building. Birdsell named Iowa Hospital Association Hospital Hero

Henry County Health Center Pharmacist Michele Birdsell has been named a 2016 Iowa Hospital Association (IHA) Hospital Hero. This is a statewide honor, and it is the first time for an HCHC associate to be recognized as an IHA Hospital Hero. In addition, Michele is the first pharmacist to have been selected for this award in the state of Iowa.

To recognize healthcare professionals for their dedication and contribution to community, IHA developed the lowa Hospital Heroes Award. In order to receive this award, one has to be employed (or recently retired) at an lowa hospital, has performed a heroic act or tirelessly given their time, talent or expertise to better their organization, patients or community, with measurable results. These everyday heroes are the role models for other hospital employees and the community they serve. They are people of integrity and honesty whose actions are evidence that they always place others before themselves.

In order to be selected for this prestigious award, all nominees' applications are reviewed by a panel of judges from other state hospital associations who know nothing of the individual or organization.

Typically, the 10 highest-scoring nominations are chosen for the award and only one award per hospital is given per year. All recipients will be recognized for the lowa Hospital Heroes Award at the lowa Hospital Association's Annual Meeting in October.

A hero is admired for outstanding achievements and noble qualities. This is true for Pharmacist Michele Birdsell who is a hero both inside the health center and out in the community.

A pharmacist at HCHC since 1996, Birdsell has positively impacted the lives of patients, staff and students for 20 years. Her actions, attitude, and day-to-day concern for our patients are evidence of the passion she has for others. When Birdsell says "my patients" she really means it, it's not just a mantra.

The impact she makes does not stop with her patients. Birdsell spends a tremendous amount of

time, talent and energy as a preceptor for pharmacy students from the University of Iowa and Drake University. In 2011, she was named University of Iowa Hospital Pharmacy Preceptor of the Year. One member of HCHC's Medical Staff said, "Michele's critical thinking skills are second to none. She goes above and beyond to pass her knowledge on to others by being a preceptor to

pharmacy students and providing education to staff."

Birdsell has been described by colleagues as a shining example of selflessness, caring and compassion. She does whatever is necessary to ensure that patients receive their needed medication in a timely manner; even when that means responding in the middle of the night, in inclement weather, when she's not on call.

Outside of HCHC, Birdsell shows her commitment to community by serving on the local Business and Professional Women's group. Within that organization she mentors young women to become professionals, and supports scholarship efforts. She is also an active participant with the American Cancer Society, and has volunteered for over 10 years with HCHC's Relay for Life team helping with fundraisers and volunteering at the Relay event.

Maya Angelou once said, "A hero is any person really intent on making this a better place for all people." This is true of Birdsell as her numerous contributions have made HCHC and the surrounding communities in Henry County a better place for us all.
